Methods: The data presented in this fact sheet were collected as part of the California Healthy Kids Survey in the 2013-2014 and 2015-2016 academic years at middle and high schools across Tulare County and throughout California. The data were collected using a paper and pencil survey administered by school sites and reported to and compiled by WestEd. Kris De Pedro, Ph.D. at Chapman University requested the dataset from WestEd and the data were analyzed running Chi-Square tests using SPSS statistical software. All differences reported here are statistically significant.
